Exploring Europe's Television Heritage in Changing Contexts

Content Selection and Metadata Handbook

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SCOPE

This document outlines the metadata elements and content selection policy for the EUscreen project, and it also outlines how the uploading of content and metadata will be supported and monitored.

This document does **NOT** cover the technical aspects of metadata content uploading. This will be the subject of a separate handbook to be published by WP4.

The document below is divided into five sections:

EUSCREEN COMMON METADATA ELEMENTS

The following are the list of elements (mandatory and optional) which will form the EUscreen Common Metadata Scheme based on the EBUcore schema. Each field will include an explanation of the information to be contained. In most instances examples of potential information are provided.

GENRE CLASSIFICATION IN EUSCREEN

Programme classification in EUScreen will be broken down into seven main headings for reasons of simplicity and scalability. The details of the subheadings for each field are below. (The table below this will demonstrate how these genres will be mapped with Video Active genre categories).

- **News:** Including news bulletins, news magazine programme, politics programmes, current affairs, newsreels, discussion programmes about events in the news, feature programmes about events in the news, elections, party conferences, political speeches, political broadcasts, live (outside broadcasts) of state occasions.
- **Drama/Fiction:** Including series drama, serial drama, single drama (teleplays), cop/police/detective/crime dramas, soap opera, telenovela, family sagas, docudrama/drama-documentary *(see note below), animated drama, telefantasy and science fiction.
- **Entertainment and performing arts:** Including comedy, stand-up comedy, situation comedy, sketch shows, political comedy, satire, cartoons (for adults and/or children) quiz and gameshows, celebrity talk shows, variety shows, cabaret, dancing shows, talent competitions, music programmes and concerts (popular and classical), ballet, pantomime and mime.
- **Factual Programming:** Including documentary (observational/fly-on-the-wall), ‘reality’ television, docu-soap, historical programmes, science programmes, natural history programmes, biographical documentaries, government information films, documentaries about the arts, travel programmes, lifestyle programmes about shopping, cookery, fashion, homes, gardens and hobbies.
- **Advertisements:** Including all commercial advertisements for consumer products and services.
- **Interstitials and trailers:** Including trailers for future programmes and events, and channel idents and logos, continuity announcements.
- **Sport:** Including regional, national and international sporting events

Note: There can sometimes be confusion between dramas that depict historical events and documentaries that involve dramatic reconstruction or which re-enact scenes or events. It will be for the content provider to decide whether the programme is intended to be a television drama (with, for example, dramatic reconstruction throughout the whole programme, and produced or commissioned by a drama department, with actors and scriptwriters) or whether the programme is intended to be a documentary (including, for example, interviews, documentary footage and dramatic reconstruction for only short sequences within the programme).

One area of genre classification where there is a problem mapping Video Active content to EUScreen is ‘Children’s television programming’. This is a problem because children’s television programmes often conform to similar genres for general consumption, indeed it is sometimes difficult to assess whether a programme is aimed at children, teenage or grown-up audiences. There are approximately 270 items of content on Video Active which are classified under ‘Children’s television’. It is therefore proposed that these programmes are reclassified at the back end of Video Active in advance of being mapped and automatically transferred to EUScreen. Colleagues in WP3/RHUL will advise relevant content providers from Video Active on which individual items require reclassification.

EUSCREEN CONTENT SELECTION POLICY

The content selection policy for EUScreen will be divided into three strands. These are:

- **Historical Topics:** 14 important topics in history of Europe in the 20th Century. (70% of EUScreen content).
- **Comparative Virtual Exhibitions:** Two topics to be confirmed that will take a more collaborative and comparative approach to selecting and presenting audio-visual material (10% of EUScreen content not included elsewhere in EUScreen).
- **Content Provider Virtual Exhibitions:** Each content provider will be able to select their own content, and support it with other digital materials and textual information, on a subject(s) or topics(s) *of their own choosing*. (20% of EUScreen content not included elsewhere in EUScreen).



The amount of content to be selected across these three strands will be outlined below (in percentage terms). The actual specific amount will be dependent on how many items of content each provider has promised to EUScreen, and this will be discussed and monitored in liaison with the WP3.3 Task Leaders (Metadata and Content Uploading and Oversight) – the BUFVC (British Universities Film and Video Council).

Historical Topics:

The 14 topics are listed below. Each partner will provide 5% of their overall EUScreen content for **each** topic – using either programmes or clips. There is a brief description of the content to be included in each topic, and below this is a table to indicate (especially for previous *Video Active* content providers) how the EUScreen content topics will be mapped to the Video Active contents.

Important notes:

- The content for each topic should include the **widest range of programme genres** (such as drama, news, factual, entertainment and performing arts etc).
- The content should also be drawn from **across the historical range for which the content partner has holdings**. For example, an archive that has content from the 1950s to the present should try and include content from across the last six decades, whereas a partner that has content from the 1990s to the present should include content from the last two decades.
- **Each item** of content *should* be attributed to **one historical topic**. If necessary it may be possible to attribute an item to more than one historical topic (a secondary topic). If a content provider would like to attribute an item to more than one topic they will need to discuss this directly with the Content Delivery team at euscreen@bufvc.ac.uk
- If content providers are unable to provide 5% of their overall contribution to EUScreen for a particular topic they should discuss this directly with the Content Delivery team at the BUFVC euscreen@bufvc.ac.uk

The Historical Topics are:

1. Arts and culture

Programmes or clips that explore aspects of arts and culture (including fine art, literature, classical and popular music).

2. Disasters

Programmes or clips that explore natural disasters (earthquakes, hurricanes, floods etc), famine, disease and major accidents (aircraft or train crashes etc).

3. Education



Programmes or clips that examine education (for example primary and secondary schools and universities).

4. Environment and nature

Programme or clips that explore aspects of the natural world, the human impact on the natural world, or how the natural world impacts on society and living conditions.

5. Health

Programmes or clips that explore issues around health and healthcare – including medical care (hospitals, doctors etc), health promotion (public and state initiatives) and ‘healthy living’.

6. Lifestyle and consumerism

Programmes or clips that explore aspects of lifestyle and consumer culture such as shopping, fashion, leisure, tourism and holidays and food and drink.

7. The Media

Programme of clips that explore the media (radio, television, newspapers and the internet) in their country.

8. National holidays, festivals, anniversaries, annual events

Programmes or clips that explore events in the national calendar, such as Christmas, New Year and Easter, national days, saints’ days and festival days.

9. Politics and economics

Programmes or clips that explore politics and economics in each country or across Europe (such as European integration).

10. Religion and belief

Programmes or clips that explore aspects of religion, and also changes in religious belief. This can include clips *about* specific religions or beliefs and could also include actual services or ceremonies.

11. Society and social issues

Programmes or clips that explore important aspects and changes in society, such as crime and punishment, drugs and alcohol, immigration (and emigration), housing, the family, feminism, and the/a sexual revolution and sexual identity.

12. Transportation, science and technology

Programmes or clips that reflect the changes in transport in Europe (such as aircraft, trains, ships and cars) and about technological developments (such as space technology in Europe, nuclear power, the home computer and the mobile telephone).

13. Wars and conflict

Programmes or clips that explore military conflicts involving European countries, the ‘Cold War’ (East vs West) and terrorism.

14. Work and production

Programmes and clips that explore changes in working conditions, manufacturing and agriculture.

Comparative Virtual Exhibitions:

The second strand of the EUscreen Content Selection Policy will be devoted to two specially devised topics (of 5% of content each) that explore more specialised aspects of European history in a more comparative manner. It is intended that these topics, to be decided, will be supported by a range of materials and resources – such as still images, digitised documents and supporting commentaries and text.

This would involve a curator or team of curators helping to decide on the kinds of content necessary to explore these specialist topics in close collaboration with the content providers. The curator/curators would also have a role in sourcing, commissioning or producing supplementary texts that help ‘interpret’ the virtual exhibition. These materials may be provided by content providers, academics, writers and museum specialists.

The mechanisms for developing and supporting these comparative virtual exhibitions are currently being discussed – and the actual topics to be included in these virtual exhibitions is yet to be agreed.

However, to provide an idea of the *kinds* of topic that *might* be developed, here are two possible ideas for the comparative virtual exhibitions.

1. Eastern European Television vs Western European Television:

An idea that was suggested in the EUscreen regional workshops was a comparison of Eastern and Western European television around sensitive political subjects. An example provided was the case of the ‘Solidarity’ trade union movement in Poland in the 1980s. While ‘Solidarity’ was recognised in Western Europe as being a popular and powerful force for political change it received little attention on Polish television. The role of the comparative virtual exhibition here would be to provide examples of Western European television coverage with the Polish coverage. This would not just provide an interesting cultural and political comparison between different television systems, it would importantly provide an audio-visual historical record of a ‘missing history’ for Polish users (researchers, educators and general users). It is anticipated that this topic could be developed to cover issues sensitive for the other Eastern European partners in the EUscreen project.

2. European Television History:

Like the Video Active project, the audio-visual content to be provided for EUscreen will provide interesting insights into the different television cultures that have emerged historically across Europe. This second topic for a comparative virtual exhibition could take a more focused look at one or two areas of key comparison, and this could then be supported in a more editorialised and structured manner with a range of texts and materials provided by, for example, members of the European Television History Network. There was an attempt to develop this kind of contextualisation in the Video Active project, but the development of editorial resources on television history on that project may have been inhibited by the large amount of content available and the size of the project. In EUscreen this activity would be dedicated to a more focused amount of material.



These and other potential topics are to be discussed and agreed. One of the factors that will determine the appropriateness of the two topics will be the practicalities inherent in asking archivists to find relevant material and the problems of asking academics and other writers to provide material for free (and which is produced voluntarily in their own free time). A decision as to the timeframe and workflow on this activity should be ready by September 2010. This activity will be led by WP3, who will consult content providers and stakeholders on this in the summer period.

Content Provider Virtual Exhibitions

A suggestion that emerged from the EUscreen kick-off meeting in the Netherlands in October 2009, and which was supported in the Regional Workshops in February 2010, was that the idea that the content providers could select their own audio-visual material using their own criteria. The suggestion was made on the basis that content providers know and understand their own archives best, and that they are therefore in a position to selection topics and material that shows off their holdings *to the best advantage*. It is an opportunity for content providers to promote their materials and to show off the strengths of television, or to demonstrate their historical and cultural interests, to a wider European community.

It is therefore proposed that content providers dedicate 20% of their content to a virtual exhibition *of their own design*. This would include content that they have selected themselves on topics or issues of their own interest. Importantly, the audio-visual content that they select *should* be supported by a range of other materials – such as still images, digitised documents and interpretive text.

The virtual exhibition that each partner would like to explore should be discussed with colleagues from WP3, and the technological tools are currently being discussed and developed to help upload supporting content. The main point, however, is that the Content Provider Virtual Exhibition is a space where each provider can pursue their own interests and strengths.
