MIMO in the Media

In December 2009, research on violins made by Antonio Stradivarius at the MIMO partner Musée de la Musique in Paris made it into international headlines, such as the [New York Times](#).

Also in December, WDR, Germany's biggest public broadcaster, ran a [report on MIMO](#) on its cultural radio station. In February 2010, MIMO was presented on MDR, one of Germany's public TV stations. MIMO was also the object of a report on the online platform of the [Zeit](#), an influential German weekly.

The attention in the press lead to increased awareness of MIMO's website. Visitors from all over the world showed viewed the webpage (see world map showing visitors for January and February). Since the beginning of the project, the website was visited 2,658 times and more than 150 MIMO readers subscribed to this newsletter.

Paris. From December 16 - 18, representatives of all MIMO partner organisations met in Paris to clarify components of MIMO's cyberinfrastructure. In the meeting, metadata issues and vocabularies stood in the foreground. Generally, MIMO will employ the Open Archive Initiative (OAI) metadata framework for harvesting to deliver digital objects to the Europeana. More precisely, MIMO will build on existing standards for the museum domain and will adapt this framework to the more specific domain of musical instruments.

The Cité de la Musique as the work package leader for OAI presented a draft of the metadata standard. Under the leadership of the Horniman Museum, the work package leader for vocabularies, we discussed which features are important for searching the database and therefore need controlled vocabularies or authority files (geographical names, ethnonyms, instrument makers, and, of course, instrument names). The instrument names should be accessible for the general public and for specialists alike.
